As you know, there are many projects and initiatives in the works in the City of Milton and I'm grateful for the opportunity to be in office when these ventures are completed. We are definitely seeing noticeable progress at the Grand Patrician Resort and the Resort's nine-hole, par three golf course. It's amazing to drive along Morris Memorial Road and see the Resort structure and the golf course greens taking shape. I'm grateful for the jobs created so far in the design and construction of what we've seen so far, but even more excited to think the jobs this venture will create when it is up and running.

Work on the flood wall is also making headway. Many folks around Milton received letters from the US Army Corps of Engineers regarding the initial wave of land acquisitions. A Zoom/telephone conference was held with those landowners to provide information and answer questions they had at that time. A second wave of acquisitions will be conducted later in the year. Here again is an instance where we might not see what goes on "behind the scenes" but that doesn't mean there isn't progression.

Paving projects continue in the City. We recently paved Cardinal Drive and Dailey Lane, the alley between Main Street and Church Street. Several areas have been patched already, and other areas will be patched as well. Very soon we are moving on to Mason Street hill, which will be widened as well as paved. Be prepared for some delays on this portion of Mason Street as this paving project is completed.



Congratulations and welcome to Putnam County Bank, which will be opening a Milton Branch soon at 500 East Main Street. They have been doing business in Putnam County since 1901, and this marks their first venture into Cabell County. Please join me in welcoming Putnam County Bank to our community!

Something I wanted to make sure you knew about is that individual disaster assistance grants for Cabell County homeowners and renters are available for damages sustained during the storms and flooding in February and March, 2021. Public Works Director Charles Conard

Can you believe that 2021 is half-way over? Time flies when you're having fun. We've gotten a lot accomplished over the last six months and there are plans for many more projects over the next six. Paving remains a top priority on the City side of public works. We continue to use money received through the Home Rule Program to repair roads, curbs and sidewalks. As the money comes in, it goes right back out to pay for improvements to our roadways, which we constantly monitor to determine which areas should be taken care of next.

Paving on Cardinal Drive and Dailey Lane from Pike to Smith Street are complete. We also have patched potholes in several areas around town. Next we will be paving Mason Street hill. We also plan to widen that section of Mason Street, which I'm sure will make a big difference traveling that road.

I'm sure you've noticed the new cemetery fence along Mason Street. It looks fantastic, and is a fitting tribute to those buried there. The funds for the fence came from a separate Cemetery Fund that's purpose is for the maintenance, upkeep and beautification of the Milton Cemetery. City employees have also been busy cleaning the headstones and grave markers, and have done a great job up there.

You have probably also noticed the "No Parking" signs along Mason Street and Glenwood Street. Parking on these streets has caused problems for as long as I can remember. Lines of traffic would have to wait until oncoming vehicles passed before they could motor ahead. In addition, there have been several incidents where people darted into the roadway between parked vehicles, nearly being struck. This safety hazard was the driving force behind the Ordinance change to prohibit parking on these two roads. I'm sure it has caused inconvenience to some who live in these areas, but public safety is of utmost importance.



We hope to receive funds from the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 very soon and have requested additional funding from the County as well. Our goal is to upgrade to a pressurized filtration system at the water plant, as well as replace water lines with whatever funds we receive. Both are necessary projects, and both are quite costly; I hope we can manage to do both in the next several years.

Code Enforcer/Building Inspector Mike Ramsey

With the nice weather comes projects. Lots of projects require hiring professional, which is my focus in this article. First, let me say there are wonderful, reliable contractors who work in the City of Milton, but the rest of my article refers to the few bad apples. I cannot stress enough that you need to do your homework and research those you are considering for a job. There have been instances in the last few months where a homeowner has been "duped." A little research and/or a phone call can save you money and lots of stress. ALL contractors be licensed and insured with the State. A simple call to my office will let you know if they have the proper licensing. NEVER pay for a job before it is complete. Dishonest, shady contractors will take the money and run. Yes, this does happen. If you become a victim, you can expect a headache. You must contact the Division of Labor, who may investigate the incident and you must file a complaint with the WV Attorney General's Office; both can take a lot of time. Quite often you will have an incomplete project to deal with, which will cost you twice as much. Also, be observant about building permits. Most contractors build a fee for the building permit into your estimate. This does not mean they obtain a permit. Some contractors simply pocket this money. A permit is required to be visibly displayed on the work site, such as on the front door or a window. If a permit is required and has not been purchased a Stop Work Order will be issued regardless of what stage of work the project is in. It is YOUR responsibility as the homeowner to assure a permit is issued. Always ask to see it and if you are told that one is not required, you can call me to verify this. Part of my job is to check on contractors at the site to ensure they are following the rules and you are getting done what you hired them to do. I cannot be everywhere and some of them do slide through the cracks. So again, take time to check them out to prevent becoming a victim. From Chief Joe Parsons

The next couple of months will be full, with the Independence Day celebration and city fire works, vacations, and families preparing to return to school in the fall. I want to caution everyone that we are deep into motorcycle season and ask that everyone watch out for our fellow motorists on motorcycles.

In mid-June we prohibited street parking on Mason Street from Smith Street to Summers Addition as well as on Glenwood Street from Mason Street to Florida Street. This was done in hopes of making a safer and easier flow of traffic on these heavily traveled streets. There will no longer be any need to weave around parked vehicles on those streets and it will decrease the problems of turning from side streets onto Mason Street. Compliance has been tremendous with very few complaints. One thing we are keenly aware of is the potential for traffic to speed up on these streets without the parked cars obstructing them. Be aware that we will conduct speed enforcement in these areas if problems arise.



After several years of seeing no violent crime in Milton we were rocked in late May and June with both a homicide and a stabbing. During the homicide we received assistance from the Cabell County Sheriff's Department, the West Virginia State Police and the West Virginia State Fire Marshall's Office. I want to publicly thank those agencies for their help during the investigation, it was invaluable. At no time during either incident was the general public in any danger from an active shooter as these were isolated incidents.

Many in the public do not realize the training each officer must undergo every year. In addition to the initial basic training academy which has now been condensed to ten weeks, officers must complete 16 hours of in-service training each year as well as qualify with their firearm twice a year, once in daylight and once in low light conditions. Supervisors must also complete 8 hours of supervisory training every other year. It makes me happy to say that our entire department will have completed their training requirements by the end of June 2021.

Hello Friends,

Since our last Miltonian, we have responded to over 91 emergency calls with only one residential fire.

As we mentioned during the last Miltonian, we are in the process of replacing two older fire trucks. Our Board and apparatus committee have been working steadily obtaining information and pricing on replacement of two fire trucks. The committee has traveled to two different manufacturing plants and we have gotten preliminary drawings already. We will keep you up to date as how it progresses. With that being said, we NEED your continued support to help us obtain the needed equipment such as fire apparatus, gear, training material and classes and our normal day to day operational expenses. Purchasing a fire truck isn't like purchasing a new car. The truck has to meet State and Federal guidelines on top of having a minimal amount of specific equipment on that truck. The cost of a fire truck ranges from \$300,000 to \$800,000 and based upon the specific needs such as pump size, tank size, length, width, equipment and the operational roles that truck is designed to do, the cost can increase substantially.



We not only serve the City Limits of Milton, we have the largest response district in Cabell County, and we are the only Volunteer fire department in Cabell County that maintains two fire stations, one in the City of Milton and our Barker Ridge station.

The City of Milton continues to grow with multi-million-dollar structures being built such as the Grand Patrician Resort, the new Elementary School and the rehabilitation of many buildings in town like the old bank on Main Street, the apartment building on Smith Street and many more.

Our membership feels the same as I do, we cannot "sit on the back burner" if you will and watch everything around us grow and not maintain growth within our department when it comes to training, personnel, and equipment. We have to meet not only the needs of our community but the State and Federal mandates for training, personnel requirements and specific equipment and apparatus.

We are fortunate to have a great community who supports us and our membership works hard to not only maintain a proven high level of quality when it comes to our operational responsibilities but they work diligently to keep up with the demands of fundraising and public services.

On June 21st our department held elections of officers. These folks will be handling the administrative and operational command responsibilities for the next four years.

From the Utilities Department

Happy Summer! We hope you are enjoying the warmer weather and longer daylight hours that come with the season. Remember, all pool fill sewer adjustment requests will be reviewed in September. Be sure to get your request in before the Utility Board meeting on September 7, 2021.

At times, we get calls inquiring about discolored water. This can be an unsettling experience, especially if you are getting ready to cook or use the bathtub or shower. There are many reasons this could occur. Sometimes discoloration is due to repairs to water lines or hydrants being used or flushed. However, there are other reasons this could happen, not all of which require service. Below we will discuss the two most common inquiries in our office.

Why Is My Water Reddish/Brown?

If a main water line breaks, there is a possibility that water could be discolored due to contaminants (typically soil) introduced to the water supply. If a main line break occurs, a precautionary boil water advisory is issued until the water can be tested to check for the presence of pathogens.

However, most reports of reddish-brown water are caused by or accompany a change in pressure within the main water line. Periodically, we must flush hydrants to release sediment and rust built up in the lines. When this happens, the water will absorb the rust and turn yellowish/reddish brown, and you may experience lower water pressure. Or, if a water line is turned off for repair, the sudden rush of waterflow when it is turned back on stirs up the sediment in the lines and can stain the water for a brief period of time. This is normal and is not a health risk.

In addition, older plumbing made from galvanized iron or steel pipes can accumulate minerals. (Bathtub spouts are often plumbed with galvanized.) Over time the pipes start to rust. When the rust dissolves in the water flowing through your pipes, the water turns a yellowish-red or brown color. This water can adversely affect the taste/color of food and can stain clothing. (Don't use bleach to treat the discoloration, it will set the stain.) However, health issues caused by this are very rare.



Check with your neighbors. Do they have discolored water? If so, flush your water pipes by hooking a hose to a spigot closest to your water main and letting it run several minutes, or opening the faucets in your home for several minutes to see if the water clears. If it does not clear, call our office so we can investigate the cause.

If your neighbor's water is clear, however, flush your water pipes for several minutes (see above) to see if the water clears. If only the hot water is discolored, check your hot water heater. If it is only discolored in the bathtub, check to see if the tub spigot is made of galvanized metal. If your water is discolored by rust from galvanized pipes, the pipes may need to be replaced with newer pipes of a non-rusting material.



Why Is My Water Cloudy/White/Milky?

Excessive air trapped in water pipes or the main supply can cause water to look white or milky. The excess air leads to a build-up of pressure, forming air bubbles in your water that are released when the tap is run, giving the water a white appearance. This aeration is generally short-lived and does not pose a health risk. Simply put, it is air in the water.

If you notice the water appears cloudy, milky or white, fill a glass with the water and let it sit for a few minutes. If the water is white due to air bubbles, the bubbles will rise to the top and the water will become clear. If the water remains white, or you detect sediment in the glass, it could indicate your water has been contaminated with small impurities such as stones, sand or dirt. In that case, call our office so that we can help determine the problem.

United Daughters of the Confederacy, Cooney Ricketts #2726 Milton

On Saturday May 8, 2021, Cooney Ricketts Chapter 2726, of the United Daughters of the Confederacy held its regular monthly meeting. We were privileged to have Linda Whaley as our guest speaker who told us a remarkably interesting and intriguing story about the 1936 unsolved murder of Mrs. Juliette Buffington Enslow.

Mrs. Enslow was a well-known socialite in Huntington. She lived in a lavish twenty-seven room mansion on 3rd Ave. Her extravagant home was adorned with marble fireplaces, crystal chandeliers and stain glass windows. But for all of her wealth it did not save her from a tragic fate.

No one really knows what happened that night but the murderer. On Friday evening, October 16, 1936, her son, Charles B Baldwin, age 41, who lived with his 63-year-old mother, had 3 friends over to play bridge. The only other people in the house that evening were her staff of servants and Lizzie Bricker, her paid companion. Juliett was last seen alive at 10:30 pm when she retired for the evening.

Around 8:30 am the next morning the chauffeur found her wallet lying in the driveway. He and the housekeeper ran to Juliette's suite where they made the grisly discovery; Juliette was on the floor, beaten and bloody with a towel wrapped around her neck. She had 5 stab wounds in her head believed to have been made with an ice pick. Eventually her oldest son, Charles B. Baldwin, was arrested and tried for her murder but was ultimately acquitted.

The only valuables missing were two very distinctive diamond rings and a watch. The watch was later found in a dresser drawer and, in an unbelievable turn of events, one of her rings was found by a street department employee in a "catch basin" in an alley behind the mansion on February 22, 1940. It seems most unlikely that the ring could have laid down there for 4 years, considering the 1937 flood.

These facts concerning the Juliette Buffington Enslow murder case were excerpted from an article on the huntington-quartly.com website. After Linda's talk, we had lunch and discussed Juliette's connections to the UDC. As it turns out, her mother, Louisa L Garland Buffington, was the first president of chapter 150 in Huntington, a position she held for seventeen years. During that time, she and Cooney Ricketts worked on many projects to help local Confederate Veterans. Her husband, Peter Cline Buffington, was the first Mayor of Huntington. And his son, Standard Buffington, was a lifelong friend of Cooney. The two grew up together in Guyandotte and fought in the war together.

FEMA DISASTER ASSISTANCE

- ✓ **If You Have Insurance, File a Claim**
Be sure to take photos to document damage. Submit any updates from your insurance company to FEMA as soon as possible.
- ✓ **Apply to FEMA**
There are multiple ways you can apply for FEMA assistance:
 - Go to www.DisasterAssistance.gov
 - Download the FEMA mobile app
 - Call the FEMA Helpline, toll-free, at **800-621-3362** (TTY 800-462-7585)
 - Visit a Disaster Recovery and Document Drop-off Center
 People with disabilities should make reasonable accommodation requests at this step.
- ✓ **Schedule a FEMA Inspection**
After applying for assistance, a FEMA inspector will typically contact you to discuss your disaster related damage and needs within 10 days.

- ✓ **Read Your FEMA Decision Letter**
FEMA will review your application and inspection information, and a decision letter will be sent to you by mail or through your DisasterAssistance.gov account. The letter will explain FEMA's decision and notify you of any additional information required to determine your eligibility. The letter also advises you on how to appeal if you disagree with FEMA's decision.
- ✓ **Use the FEMA grant for disaster-related purposes**
The notification letter from FEMA explains the type of assistance and how to use the funds appropriately.
- ✓ **Save Receipts and Maintain Good Records**
Document how the funds were used and retain records for all repairs, cleanup, and disaster-related costs for at least three years.





FEMA, providing a denial of coverage letter from your insurance provider. The deadline to register is July 19th, so be sure to take these steps as soon as possible. Small businesses may also be eligible for grants, but they must first apply for a low-interest disaster loan. Even if you decline a loan, assistance may be available. If you want more information on this, please review the information FEMA provided which is attached to the Newsletter, check out the links on our website, or visit disasterassistance.gov.
